The Ice Fall Doctors are responsible for setting the fixed lines each spring through the Khumbu Ice Fall on Mount Everest. It is an extremely dangerous job with hazards like avalanches, moving glaciers and tumbling seracs threatening them everyday. Hundreds of climbers rely on the ropes and ladders (used for crossing large crevasses) that these men set and would be unable to climb Mount Everest without their help.
