FRANZ-KARL EHRHARD is Professor of Tibetan and Buddhist Studies at the University of Munich, Germany. His research work centres on religious and literary traditions in Tibet and the Himalayas. His latest publications include *Early Buddhist Block Prints from Mang-yul Gung-thang* (Lumbini International Research Institute 2000), and *Life and Travels of Lo-chen bSod-nams rgya-mtsho* (Lumbini International Research Institute 2002).

ALEX MCKAY is a research fellow at the Wellcome Trust Centre for the Study of the History of Medicine at UCL (London) and an affiliated fellow at the International Institute for Asian Studies in Leiden. His most recent publication is a three volume edited *History of Tibet* (London, 2003).

His research is based on forming understandings of state and politico-religious establishments in the early years of Sikkimese history. He has six years of experience in Tibetan language with a focus on historical literature.

JACKIE HILTZ is an independent researcher living in Seattle, Washington. She received her B.A. and M.A. degrees in history from Stanford University and the University of Montana. She is the co-editor of *American Wars in Asia: A Cultural Approach to History and Memory* (M.E. Her current research focuses on the recent history of Sikkim.
