(from quire p onwards there is double ruling) XII cent., fine round English hand, red headings and plain red capitals with occasional use of green.

Binding probably original, of ~~modern~~ oak boards with bevelled edges, uncovered, ^{to} 3 bands. The upper board alone remains, somewhat wormed, with the anchorage of a strap-and-pin fastening; also the semicircular flaps of white skin at each end of the spine.

Et innocentibus in presenti' (Seculo).
Ed. by W. A. Bachrrens, Origenes worke VI (Leipzig 1920); this is a ms of his class C (preface p.xi), for it contains the spurious 17th Homily on Genesis.
Ff. 1-4 (3 is lost) are flyleaves, with scribbled notes prescriptions etc. in XVI cent. (partly humanist) hands.

From the Cistercian abbey of Waverley (Surrey). On qb is a ^{XIII cent.} ~~contempor~~ list of contents first in the hand of the Abt: In hoc volumine continantur omelie Origenis/ Super Genesim; octodecim omel'/ super Exodum; xliii/ Super Leviticum; xvi. Below this, in a smaller not much later hand: Wauerlea, liber tuis est hic, criminis libert/ Non erit ante Deum, qui libri tollit eum. Subsequently belonged to the Cope family, of Bramshill/ not far from the abbey (Historical MSS Commission, Third Report, 1878, Appendix p. 242), and was no. 157 in the Cope sale at Sotheby's, 4 March 1913. Bought for the library of P. M. Barnard, 15 May 1913.
