

# 6150 SPECULUM CHRISTIANI

Vellum, 12x8½ in., vi+35 ff. (out of 38; 1 and 35 lost),  
single column, 33-38 lines to the page. XV cent.,  
in a clear English hand with red headings and blue capitals flourished in red.  
3 flyleaves, a<sup>8</sup>(wants 1) b-d<sup>8</sup> e<sup>6</sup>(wants 3), 3 flyleaves  
Original white skin over bevelled oak boards, strap-and-pin fastening lost, title Speculum  
Christiani in large red and black letters on lower cover.

Explicit Speculum Christiani. 37-38<sup>b</sup> contain further biblical and  
patristic Excerpts in the same style as the text, largely but not entirely  
identical with those in Oxford, Bodleian Library Ms Add. A 268 (29387); see  
the edn. by G. Holmstedt, EETS 182 (1933), p. xx; the last is De Antichristo.  
The missing f. 35 contained cavere peccatum (p. 233 l. 9 of the print) — aliusvis reparatione  
(p. 257 l. 18). English verses are found on ff. 5-8 (IMEV no. 1491, in red); 11<sup>b</sup>-13 (no.  
4150, in red); 17<sup>b</sup>-18<sup>b</sup> (no. 2167, in red); 18<sup>b</sup>-21<sup>b</sup> (nos. 1342 and 2119), followed by the  
Ladders to Heaven and Hell.

i-iii and iv-vi (iv and v ~~are~~ mostly torn out) have some early scribbles, one in red chalk. Among  
them are (iii) Thomas Robynson — xii<sup>d</sup> and Duggys, (iv) Memorandum quod Robertus  
Symys, (vi) rough sketch of a chalice or coconut cup on 12-sided foot.

At the end of the text in red is: Orate pro ... pro amore Domini nostri Ihesu Christi. On f. ii  
late liber pertinet domino ... [Roger over an itawee] ... / de Wolsingham (?)<sup>(1)</sup> emptus de domino  
... Danby (?) Anno domini m<sup>o</sup> ccc<sup>o</sup> lxij<sup>o</sup>. Pasted in lower cover a note. "This MS  
was given me by H.H. Sills M.A. Fellow of King's College, from the library of his uncle at Cold  
Bath House, Lincoln. He understood that I should most likely give it to the University  
Library; which I now do. 17 August 1918. M.R. James."
