Vellum, $9\frac{1}{4} \times 7\frac{1}{2}$ in., 124 ff, single column, 30 - 56 lines to a page. XIII cent. small pointed, probably French, the comment in smaller script, with paragraph marks, and capitals with counterchanged filling and flourishing, alternately in red and blue. Indented initials in red and blue with conventional foliage filling and flourishing. Marginal figures to the propositions very well drawn: I, 46 has 'dilectum' in red (vide Chaucer's Troilus and Cressida, III, stanzas 133-4); III, 8 'canda pavoris', and a flourish at the top.
