4095). The spine repaired, the clasps ~~perhaps~~ renewed.

Printed in the Aldine edn. of Politian's Opera (Venice 1498). Among the marginalia
copied by the scribe, three (ff. 68, 84^b, 111^b) refer to the original Greek MS.

— The decoration is very beautiful. ff. F.1 has the title in gold capitals on a rectangular tablet of
blue, a gold satyr-mask on coloured ground in the initial, and a lateral shaft of vases and
foliage (the vellum beneath flecked with gold), in which is a small rectangular gold cameo
shewing horsemen fighting. F.4 has a similar tablet for the title, and a full border of Renaissance
ornament on plain vellum ground flecked with violet, ^{framed in two rows of coral beads and gold fleurs-de-lys and} incorporating a circular medallion of
Marcus Aurelius (gold on black) and at foot a coat of arms: Az. 2 crayfish hauriant and in
chief an estoile or, on a chief of the last ~~an~~ eagle displayed sa.

Each book has a small foliage initial on square coloured ground.

— Inside the lower cover are two inscriptions: (a) Henrico Gambetta 1511 die 22 Octobris (b) Petrus
Axen Husum — Slesvicensis compars Venetiis Anno Christiano MDC LXVII Mayo Mense (he no
doubt wrote the late note on f. 79^b). Subsequently belonged to Baron Achille Siciliere, his sale (Paris
1890) to Ellis. No. 273 in a catalogue of Ellis and Elvey, from whom it was bought by Samuel Sanders. Sanders
