Marks are erased on ff. 4 and 5, but part of an inscription remains on 4: Cronica que dicuntur Chester, and the initial on f. 13 has a picture on gold ground of St Katherine crowned, holding up a wheel, and a black monk kneeling to her on <u>L</u> with scroll: Me thomam mina precor arnoldum kater(ina). In the border of this page are three shields. <u>L</u> <u>az</u> a sword and two keys in saltire <u>arg</u> (hilt of sword <u>or</u>) (resembles Winchester but there the field is <u>gu</u>. Chester Priory is said to have borne 3 mitres (Woodward, <u>Eccl. Heraldry</u>, p. 194)); <u>C</u> <u>sable</u> a cross <u>arg</u> for St Augustine's; <u>R</u> gu 3 busts of kings crowned or.

In the St Augustine's Catalogue, no. 934 (<u>Anc. Lib.</u> p. 297) is: Cronica cestrensis T. Arnold cum tabula. 2° fo. in libro <u>Britannice</u> (see above).

In the cover and on f. 3 are pasted two Parkerian labels. On f. 4 is a transcript of Higden's acrostic from the initials of chapters of Book I.

At f. 152^a VII 43 (44) coronation of Edward III: mare tranquillitatem et ecclesia libertatem, is <u>Explicit historia</u> but the text continues: Et cito post hoc 3^o nonas april. translatus est rex antiquus de kenelworth (Rolls Ed. VIII, 324).

On f. 153 after the words sub pena carceris et capitis interdixit (l. c. VIII, 338) is a scrawly marginal note of cent. xv - xvi: alius liber scriptus habet hec in margine: Hucusque Randulphus, followed by a

5 11^b correction in a Parkerian hand. But at the top is a long note of cent. xvi beginning: Hic reuera Ranulphus monachus Cestrensis suas chronicas terminauit. Some similar notes are in CCCC. 117.

This is MS A of the Rolls Series edition. An account of it with further particulars of these notes is given in Vol. I p. xlvii, but the Canterbury provenance is not divined.

The border on f. 13 is the most important piece of ornament in the volume. It is not of any great excellence, but is effective. Each Book has an initial in gold and colour.
